Chairman's Chat

Now that the fishing season is in full swing I trust you are all catching as well as you hope. One of the delights of fishing is the solitude when one can enjoy the surroundings and day dream as much as you want.

Since my chief fishing companion lives 90 miles away I often fish alone but if I want company there is usually a fellow angler that will tolerate my chatter.

On my last outing with the Guild to Ashbourne, I realised what a delight it is to spend a day with a group of like minded friends and to enjoy the gentle teasing as I miss yet another fish. To all of you who do not regularly attend our outings I can thoroughly recommend them to you. No one expects you to be an expert and although you may not always catch fish you will certainly finish the day refreshed and happy.

Now that the warmer weather is with us don't neglect the dry fly. You do not have to see fish rising before you give it a try. In clear water a trout will move up several feet to investigate a disturbance to the surface film. If you see the water boil near your fly but there is no movement on your line just wait a minute for a trout will sometimes return to look for the drowned fly. Last week I took eight trout from Arlington all on dry fly (claret hopper) while those fishing lures and nymphs struggled.
