Meeting nights start again on 16th September with a guest speaker.


Tying nights recommence on 23rd September.

PIKE ON THE FLY

Fly-Fishing for Pike is a relatively new sport that is generating much enthusiasm and many converts from dedicated fly-fishers and anglers

looking for a new challenge. Published price£25, but available on Amazon at £17.50.

David Wolsoncroft-Dodds has enjoyed many years successfully fishing for pike and is keen to open fly-fishers' minds to the excitement of fishing for a large, wild, challenging quarry. Here in this authoritative and comprehensive guide, he shares his wealth of experience providing information on techniques, tackle, flies and tactics that are tried and tested by the author and his many pupils who have been converted to the challenge of catching pike on the fly. I hope that Paul Bond will invite him to speak at a meeting in the near future at Brighton.

David Wolsoncroft-Dodds is a professional pike fly-fishing guide and instructor. He writes on the subject, demonstrates at game fairs and gives talks at fly-fishing clubs. He has pursued his passion for the sport on the many types of water where pike live and in many different countries. He lives in Wiltshire with his wife and two children. I have met David and found him very enthusiastic and you should see the size of the hooks he uses!

PIKE FISHING AT WEIR WOOD

Weir Wood has always been well known for the huge Pike that lurk in the shallow, accessible, clean water flowing from the upper reaches of the Medway. For the past 10 years or so they have thrived on the abundance of Skimmers and Roach that live in the lake and now have the added bonus of trout casualties as well!

We will be holding a series of open days for the Pike starting on October 1st which will include some specific fly only days to encourage our trout anglers to give fly fishing for Pike a go. Pike fishing will be from boats only.

Each day will start at 8.00 with breakfast (included in your permit) at the fishing lodge followed by a briefing and then boats out at 8.30am. The day will finish at 4pm when there will be a prize given for the biggest Pike caught and verified each day.

Permit prices £50 per boat (one or two anglers per boat maximum 2 rods per angler) method restrictions will apply.

October 1st Pike opening day - Fly-fishing only.

October 14th Pike day all methods. October 26th Pike day all methods.

November 12th Pike day - Fly-fishing only.

November 13th Pike day - all methods. November 20th Pike day - all methods.


A Fly Catcher Spotted

No, not a Spotted Fly Catcher, instead a very clever little device for catching, or rather retrieving, those elusive flies that for some inexplicable reason seem to end up in the lower branches of the surrounding trees rather than on the nose of a trout as intended! I came upon this clever invention whilst reading my Meon Springs newsletter and am indebted to Brian J Wilkins for generously allowing us to publish part of his article here:

- 1. You will need about eight inches of plastic tubing, some light cord, a wine cork and approximately 8 to 10 inches of wire such as that from a bicycle wheel spoke.
- 2. Force the wire through the cork and fashion the bottom into an eye, to which you will attach 12 to 15 feet of light cord.
- 3. Bend the part of the wire protruding through the top of the cork into a hooked shape.
- Push the cork into the top of the plastic pipe (needless to say the internal bore of the pipe should be the right fit to receive the cork).
- 5. Thread the pipe onto the tip of your rod, raise the rod and hoist the tip of the hook over the offending branch.
- Remove the rod from the tube leaving the hook over the branch and pull gently on the cord, bringing the branch down towards you till the fly is within reach and can be retrieved.

This is an easy tool to make and carry in your game bag and one which other members may wish to copy. *See diagram below*:

Fly Fishing for Pike - Branch Outings

In conjunction with Mark Carr-Brown I intend to organise two Fly Fishing for Pike outings for the branch at Weir Wood Reservoir. These dates coincide with Weir Wood's special Pike only days (see separate article in this newsletter). The two dates for your diary are Friday 1st October (the 'gala' opening day of Pike fishing at Weir Wood – and it is a Pike only day, and furthermore only fly fishing is allowed) and the second date is Saturday 13th November (which is also a Pike only day, but any method (i.e. spinning and bait is allowed). Both days are boat fishing only, and the cost is £50 per boat (2 anglers). If you haven't got a boat partner already then please still register your interest as I can match single anglers to fill a boat. The cost also includes breakfast and a prize for the largest pike caught on the day (it needs to be verified – so remember to take your scales and a digital camera!). Also Brian Hendry is holding two 'Pike flies' classes on Thursday 23rd and Thursday 30th September during our normal Thursday tying evenings at Patcham therefore giving you ample opportunity to fill your fly box with appropriate patterns to try out on these days at Weir Wood.
