BALANCED SEAS

Tony Woolnough reports:

You will no doubt remember that, on behalf of the Branch, I have been keeping an eye on the proposals to produce Marine Conservation Zones (MCZ). MCZ are areas of the sea bed which will be designated as "not take" zones where fishing is restricted or banned altogether. To date consultations in the UK are complete and the various comments and recommendations being assembled to aid the decision making process.

Consultations have also been carried out with like bodies on the French side of the Channel who intend to establish conservation zones of their own - in other words, not much to report.

My main concern remains the risk of zones being established where fishing for some species will be banned. Obviously this will be entirely impractical since fishing methods do not discriminate between species and many fish would continue to be dumped dead. In addition the only way to police these zones would be for the coastguard service to use their radar cover. This of course has another weakness; fishermen would claim to be fishing for permitted species, whilst taking protected species. In addition boats within the zone would need to be inspected at sea.

I also received another Newsletter from the Science Advisory Panel (SAC) which modestly describe themselves as "expert marine scientists". As many of my customers are "scientists" I am well aware of their "expertise" and in future I will keep a careful eye on their proposals!

The gist of the Newsletter is that deadlines for consultation with stakeholders have been extended and further meetings with interested parties have been carried out. The academics managing the project have discovered (surprise, surprise), that there is a need for more time for discussion with Stakeholders at meetings. The project team has therefore developed a more flexible approach to meeting structures. As we all know, there is a fine line between meetings developing into talking shops and giving everyone an opportunity to state their case.

I await production of the first draft map of the proposed Marine Conservation Zones, which I will place in our newsletter and invite your comments, so that I ensure that I represent the wishes and concerns (if any) of Club members.

CHAIRMAN'S CHAT LINES

What do we know about our quarry?

Swimming speeds.

Fish swimming speed depends on the condition of the fish, species, water temperature and surprisingly, length. Considering only healthy salmonids (including our rainbows and browns) the main determinates are water temperature and fish length. To take fish length out of the equation, biologists (and fisheries engineers) refer to swimming speeds in terms of body lengths per second (bl/s). Adopting this unit of bl/s, we arrive at some surprising results for maximum recorded swimming speeds:

Salmonids	10 bl/s
Carp	10 bl/s
Yellowfin Tuna	21 bl/s
Herring	8 bl/s

A contact I have on the West coast of Ireland owns a bluefin tuna fishing boat and reports the these fish take an artificial squid lure and make an initial run at 55 mph for half a mile. This is impressive and explains why the local hospital is full of anglers with torn ligaments and bad backs.

In terms of absolute speed we find:

Sailfish	30 m/s	67 mph
Marlin	36 m/s	80.5 mph !!!!!

These values were obtained by using side-scanning sonar, piscatometers (ie fishing reels with speedometers attached) and artificial channels with pumped water supply.

An interesting speed value obtained by side scanning sonar, of an unknown species of sea fish, was 32 m/s, this fish travelled 8 m in 0.25 secs and 7 m in the next 0.25 secs (i.e. 15 metres in half a second, or 67 mph) – I hope I don't hook that one !

For design purposes, swimming speeds can be divided into darting, burst, sustained and cruising.

Darting is the maximum speed that can be achieved by a single effort sustained only momentarily. For salmonids this is typically 10 bl/s - hence those smash takes we experience all too infrequently.

Burst speed is defined as the speed that can be sustained for up to 20 seconds using white muscle. This is the speed at which a trout will "take off" when hooked i.e. the start of the fight - typically 4 bl/s.

Sustained speed is a speed that can be maintained for up to about a minute and a half - typically 3.5 bl/s using red muscle. This is the dogged resistance that a hooked fish will use to avoid capture to the very end.

Cruising speed, as the name suggests, is the speed that a fish can maintain for hours, eg during marine migration. Typical values are 1.5 bl/s.

In practice there will be a seamless transition from one defined speed to another and a mixture of all swimming abilities demonstrated by a taking fish.

So what do the above figures mean to us?

A typical 400 mm long rainbow in good condition and swimming in water at a temperature (more info. later) of say 10 deg. C can snatch your lure at 9 mph and run at 3.5 mph for 20 secs, and continue to fight, making runs at 1.3 mph until finally tiring due to resistance from the rod, or in my case get off !

Sussex Piscatorial Society

The Sussex Piscatorial Society is pleased to announce it has been asked to take over the management of Colin Godmans Farm Trout Fishery near Furners Green, East Sussex. This fishery has been operated as a private syndicated water for the past thirty years. For those that do not know this fishery it is a beautiful and intimate three lake complex of approximately seven acres, set in stunning and quiet surrounding just north of Sheffield Park.

Whilst all the existing Society Lakes are now open all year, Colin Godmans will continue to be a seasonal fishery for this coming season; starting in April, the fishing will continue until October. The Fishery will be run along the same lines as all other SPS trout waters and we will be stocking our usual range of superb quality, hard fighting, Brown and Rainbow Trout from 1½ to 5lb with many over-wintered and grown on fish exceeding these weights. Since changing our fish suppliers two years ago our members are reporting the best fishing ever, with these super fit fish often taking lines onto the backing.

Any Guild members interested in joining the SPS should enquire soon, as the Trout membership is capped and numbers have nearly reached this cap. The Society is therefore expecting to return to having a waiting list for prospective members quite early in this season. Membership for 2011 is £250 for the season and there is a one off Society Joining fee of £50. This represent tremendous value as members can fish up to three times a week throughout the season on any of our six trout still waters and our two sections of the river Itchen in Hampshire.

How are your rod rings?

I wonder how often we check our rods in the winter to make sure they will be serviceable through to next season? Now is as good a time as ever. I recently took an angler out for some tuition, as he wanted to improve his technique for river fishing. He wished to use his own tackle and I quickly checked it over and did a few casts with the rod. What I did notice was that the snake rings had seriously worn. Where do you think the wear was found? Not on the top inner side of the ring, but two grooves on each ring close to the blank! These grooves were so deep that you could cut your finger and cut through your fly line. Now go and check your rods – the chances are that if it is a few years old, the rings will all require replacing. You can do this yourself, or you may find someone in the branch or go to a specialist like Graham Dadswell. If it is a DIY job then follow the tips below which I recently found.

You will first have to remove the rings from the rod blank, and this is not a very easy job on modern rods. The reason is that most rings are tied and then varnished with a high build “epoxy” varnish that is very hard. This needs to be removed with the utmost care and I suggest the following procedure: Take some masking tape and wrap it around the rod at the very ends of the varnish both above and below the whippings. This is to protect the blank should your knife slip! With a very sharp blade, e.g. a new Stanley Knife blade, cut into the varnish. Assuming you are right handed and with the rod laid on a bench of some sort with the thin end pointing to the left, make the incision against the metal foot of the faulty ring. By so doing, the blade will cut into the metal and not the blank. It does take time - gently cut, do not try cutting it all off in one go - it does not work. If the blade slips, as it often does, hopefully it will catch the wraps of tape and not damage the blank. Once the varnish and thread is cut through to the ring foot, it is often possible to peel it off. Remove the first bit then turn the rod around and repeat the process. Finally, gently remove all traces of finish using wet and dry abrasive paper.

Be mindful if you change from snake rings to ceramic lined ones, it may affect the action of the rod. I am sure this is the reason why we rarely see mass produced rods with anything other than snakes (or is it for commercial reasons?). I remember in the distant past there was much discussion on this subject in the angling press and I cannot remember a convincing conclusion. *P.E.*
